
solutions that drive innovation and create systems and processes that would enable the world to move forward in the "new normal."

At the Savoy Hotel in London, on 3 November 1919, a group of senior transport professionals met determined to change the world of logistics and transport. In the First World War they had seen the failures of moving goods and vehicles. Now in peacetime they wanted to create a professional body that would make a difference and set new standards. This was the birth of the Institute of Transport.

The group's initial aims were to improve transport efficiency, enable transport integration and encourage talent development in the transport industry. Aims that we still strive to achieve today. In 1926 we were granted a Royal Charter by King George V with himself as the Patron and the Prince of Wales as the Honorary President. The Institute grew in importance and influence across the world. We established territorial organizations in ten countries and in 1971 we were granted the name of the Chartered Institute of Transport by Queen Elizabeth II. In 2001 we became the Chartered Institute of Logistics and Transport as the two leading professional bodies joined together.

The Chartered Institute of Transport (CIT) Sri Lanka was established in 1984 and incorporated by the parliamentary act no. 08 of 2000. In 2001, following the merger of the two leading professional bodies, CIT Sri Lanka became the Chartered Institute of Logistics and Transport (CILT) Sri Lanka. In 2012, the Council of Trustees of CILT upgraded the status of CILT Sri Lanka from a Branch to a Territory. In doing so, the Council of Trustees recognized the high standards in performance, governance and membership development evidenced by CILT Sri Lanka over the past several years. This upgrading of status took place at the CILT International Convention and Annual General Meeting held in Birmingham from 11 - 14 June 2012. The notice of upgrade was presented to Mr. Romesh David, CMILT, then Chairman of CILT Sri Lanka, by Her Royal Highness Princess Anne, the

Princess Royal, who is the Patron of the Institute. CILT Sri Lanka is governed by a Council consisting of professionals representing all segments of the Transport and Logistics industry.

CILT Sri Lanka consists of two wings, Women in Logistics and Transport (WiLAT) Sri Lanka and Next Generation (YPF) Sri Lanka, which are dedicated for the development and empowerment of women and youth of the logistics and transport industry.

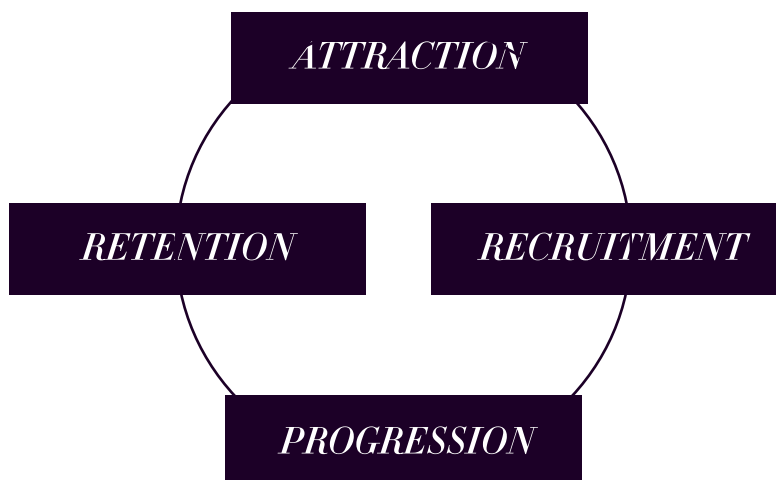

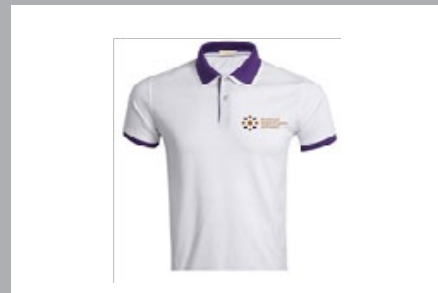

Membership Database

The new membership database is fully operational. Members can login and pay their subscriptions, and purchase tickets for CILT events through the database. The membership card is RFID enabled and a POS system has been introduced for payments.

CORPORATE PARTNERSHIP PROGRAMME (CPP)



The Corporate Partnership Programme is one of the key priority focus areas for CILT globally with a view to uplifting the image of CILT and promoting the profession among corporates. CILT Sri Lanka launched its CPP in October 2011.

Over the past few years CILT has seen a steady increase in the number of Corporate Partners. The thrust of the CILT global strategy is to have an inclusive approach to include all stakeholders engaged in logistics, transport, associated services which could be broadly categorised under the following categories:

- Operators - Directly involved in providing logistics and transport services
- Suppliers - Companies providing products and services to logistics companies
- Manufacturers - Users of logistics services
- Retailers/Sellers - Those who require logistics services
- Education - Academic institutions providing logistics related programs
- Military
- Government

In order to be more inclusive, CILT Sri Lanka revamped its CPP in January 2018. Under the revamped CPP, corporates can choose between four corporate partner packages namely, Platinum, Gold, Silver or Bronze.

In the new CP scheme, CPs who have been with CILT CP programme from its inception in 2011 were recognized as Patron Partners. Out of the 15 originally inducted as CPs 13 have been continuing with CILT Sri Lanka and are categorized as Patron Partners. The CP programme is an annually renewable contract which runs from **01st January to 31st December to each year.**

As at 1st January 2021 CILT Sri Lanka had 24 CPs enrolled under the revamped CPP. In view of Covid-19 impact five (05) CPs had decided not to renew their commitments for 2020/2021. Two (02) CPs are having discussion with CILT Sri Lanka. However, four (04) new CPs, i.e. Fonterra Brands Pvt Ltd, Ocean University, **Lineage Logistics and TWS Lanka Pvt Ltd joined for year 2020/2021 making the total 24 CPs.**

The Corporate Partnership Programme is a good opportunity for companies to partner with CILT Sri Lanka for mutual benefit. CILT Sri Lanka is hopeful that the CPs who did not renew will rejoin the programme next year and reap the benefits.

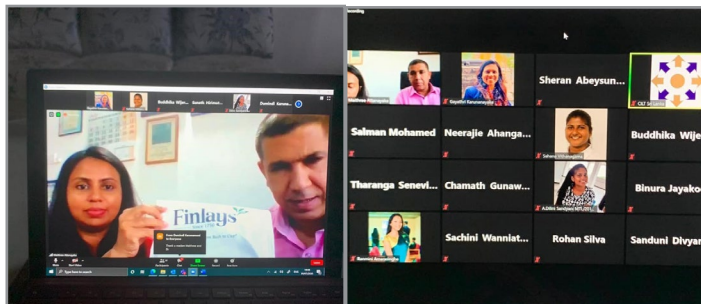
WiLAT Sri Lanka Strategic Planning Workshop

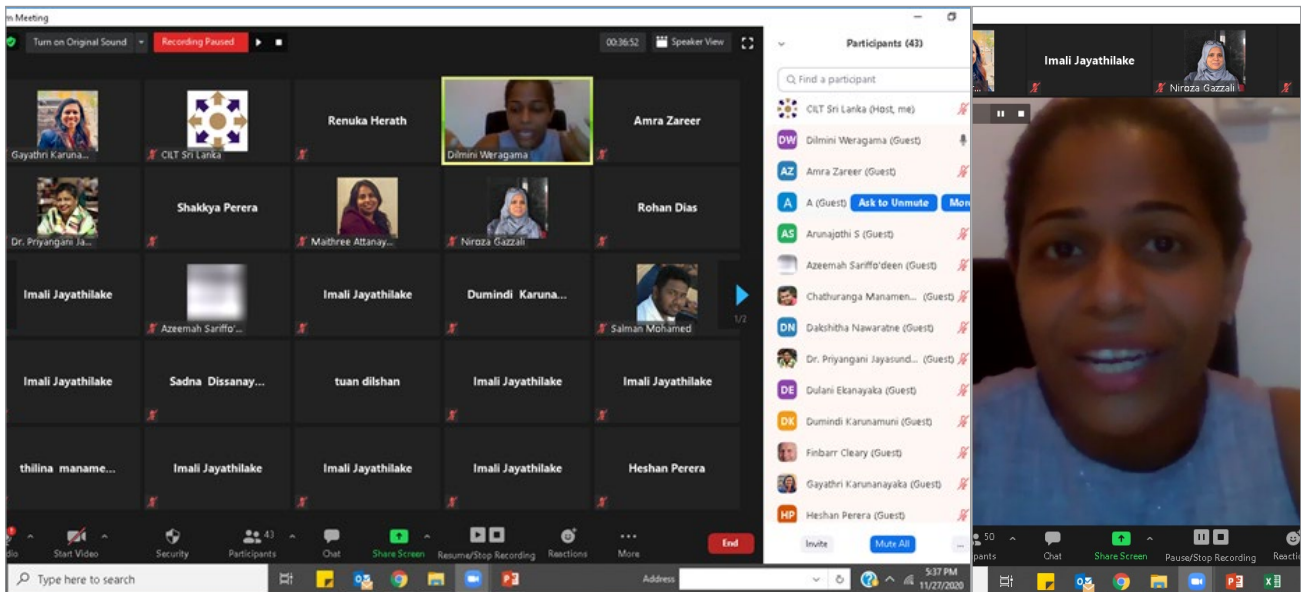
Leading with Empathy with Dilmini Weragama

WiLAT Sri Lanka pioneered the “Ignite” mentoring program in the WiLAT world, initially launching in 2014. Later the initiative went on to global platform and now present in several other WiLAT countries.

Ignite is a program which provides a platform for both mentors and mentees to commence and continue their mentoring relationship under a well-structured procedure. Mentors extend their time and effort on a voluntary basis towards unearthing talents developing soft and hard skills and unleashing the passion of the mentees selected from the applications of undergraduates following Transport, Logistics and Supply Chain related studies and young professionals who have just started their careers in the Transport and Logistics industry in Sri Lanka. Currently we have connected with more than 100 mentors throughout and have worked with 150 mentees for the past 6 years.

Ignite 6 was launched in November 2019 with 32 mentees from different universities who are following the education streams of logistics and transport. Students from the University of Moratuwa, University of Kelaniya, University of Sri Jayawardenapura, Kothalawala Defence University, Ocean University of Sri Lanka & CINEC Maritime campus have been enrolled for Ignite 6. 20 mentors were engaged in the program who were selected through CILT member base. 4 programs have been carried out over a period of one year for the mentoring student community for active engagement including a session on young adults’ mental health conducted by a renowned psychologist in the country. Ignite 6 was concluded in a grand closure ceremony that paid tribute to all the mentors and mentees.

Continuing the same, WiLAT successfully launched the 7th edition of its well reputed very own signature mentoring program Ignite on the 3rd of March 2021 via Zoom at 5.30 pm. More than 60 participants were virtually attended to witness 7-year journey of Ignite Mentoring program of Women in Logistics and Transport Sri Lanka. 120 applications were received from various private and local universities proving the increasing demand for the program. Mentees were selected through a careful selection procedure and 30 female and male mentees were selected representing every public and private university that offers Logistics and Supply Chain related degrees: Ocean University, Cinec Campus, Moratuwa University, Kelaniya University and Kotelawala Defense University. Well experienced 15 mentors were volunteered to groom these fresh mentees to ensure that they are ready to step into a very dynamic industry of logistics and supply chain management.

Guest Speaker of the event was Mr. Amethe Gamage (Co - Founder Quantum Leap (Pvt) LTD, Coach, Personal Branding Strategist) highlighted the importance of mentee and mentor relationship in professional and personal lives by using his own examples from his own career journey, to share his thoughts on "Igniting a mentorship" with the audience.

Along with the social media campaign which was held to honour the mentor's tireless efforts, commitment and contribution towards Ignite 6 which

is the 2019 program, and the best mentee of Ignite 6 was also selected by choosing the best poster in which mentees demonstrated their journey with their mentors over the past year. The winner was selected by WiLAT Executive committee and was awarded by the Ignite Event partner South Asia Gateway Terminals SAGT Sri Lanka.

Further, the WiLAT Chairperson Mrs Gayathri Karunanayake mentioned in her speech that WiLAT flagship initiative "Ignite" mentoring program was launched in November 2014 in line with WiLAT mission which is to "Provide a forum for women engaged in the industry to network and create opportunities for career advancement & empower them to become leading professionals. 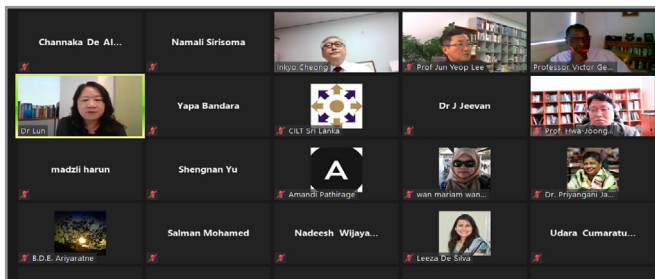

CILT INTERNATIONAL RESEARCH SYMPOSIUM

On 11th December 2020, CILT Sri Lanka hosted BRIC 2020 on the theme “Strategizing for Mutual Gain though the Belt and Road Initiative” in association with Jung Seok Research Institute of International Logistics Trade (JRI) of Inha University of Rep of South Korea and with the support of Yangtze-River Research and Innovation Belt (Y-RIB) and International Collaboration Network - Belt and Road Initiative (ICN-BRI).

The conference started at 8am (SL time) and included several research presentations and two keynote speeches focusing on the Belt and Road Initiative and Maritime Industry Dynamics. All the research publications were published in the conference proceedings.

Dangerous Goods Webinar

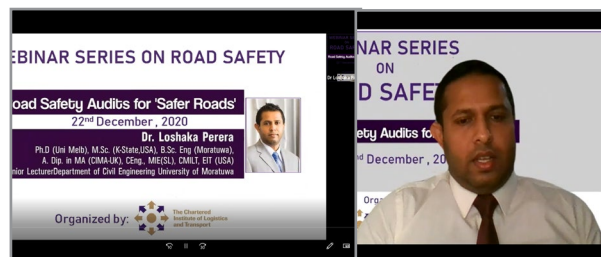

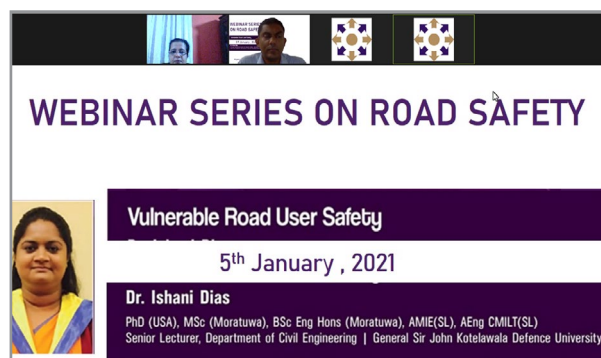

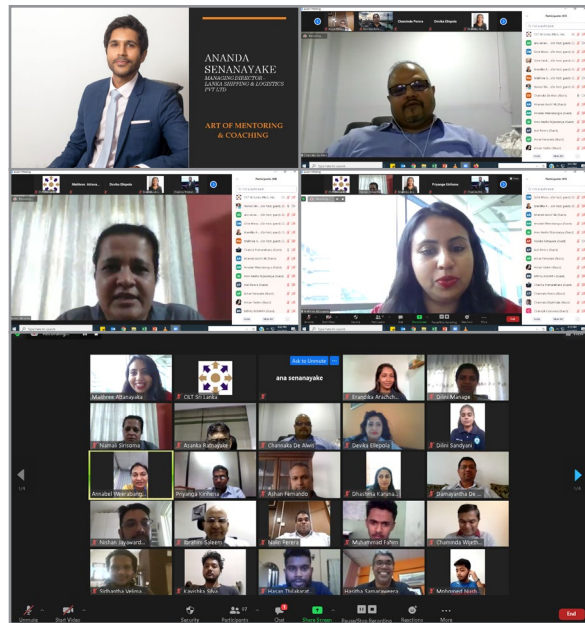


CILT MENTORING PROGRAM

Going in line with its vision of 'to be the most prominent professional body in the central region facilitating regional development in logistics and transportation,' CILT Sri Lanka Central Chapter organized several events during the period.

Since the country was locked down due to COVID-19 and was gradually touching the new normal, the organized events were on virtual basis. In fulfilling the objective of conducting high quality professional development programmes for the members with the aim of developing them to their full potential, the Central Chapter organized the following webinar sessions during the period.



Webinar Session 1:

A webinar session on the topic of “How to Achieve the Sustainable Development Goals Within the Planetary Boundaries?” conducted by Dr. Chanjief Chandrakumar on 04th June 2020. He is an alumnus of DMIE and was recently appointed as a Senior Advisor to the Government of New Zealand. He is an Engineer turned Scientist, who researches on climate change mitigation and adaptation as well as development and implementation of sustainability assessment approaches/methodologies.

The talk centred on the development of a framework that investigates the inter-linkages between three popular sustainability assessment approaches/methodologies such as Life Cycle Assessment, Sustainable Development Goals, and Planetary Boundaries. The usefulness of this framework was then discussed in terms of the development of Science-Based Target approaches while introducing several case studies undertaken in New Zealand and elsewhere. Followed by the talk, a brief discussion was held to discuss the challenges/limitations in developing such frameworks/approaches, including Science-Based Target approaches, and to explore how these limitations can be overcome in the future.

Webinar Session 2:

The session held on 18th June 2020 based on the topic: “Manufacturing Excellence” and conducted by Mr. Manoharan Nadarajah, Director, Supply Chain for Coca Cola Beverages Sri Lanka Limited. Mr. Manoharan Nadarajah is an astute supply chain professional with over 28 years of experience in manufacturing, engineering, quality, health & safety, and environment logistics. His talk focused on meeting customer expectations through the continuous improvement of the operational processes and the culture of the organization.

Webinar Session 3:

Guest speaker Dr. Prasanna Illangakoon from Lulea University, Sweden, conducted the webinar on 25th June 2020 under the theme of “In Search for You and Me: Human’s Role in Industry 4.0”. The session shed light on the area of human intervention on selection of data to train systems and make final decisions in an era where systems are advanced and intelligent.

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

1.1 Reporting Entity

The Chartered Institute of Logistics and Transport Sri Lanka (“the Institute”) is an Association registered and located at 450, D.R. Wijewardana Mawatha, Colombo 10.

1.2 Principal Activities and nature of Operation

The principal activities of the Institute are to promote and encourage the art and science of logistics and transport. The Association is governed by the Council members in accordance with the rules set out in the rule book of the Association.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

2.1 Statement of Compliance

The financial statements of the Institute which comprise of the statement of financial position, statement of income and expenditure and accumulated fund and statement of cash flows together with the accounting policies and notes to the financial statements of the institute as at 31st December 2020 and for the year then ended are prepared in accordance with Sri Lanka Accounting Standard for Small and Medium – sized Entities (“SLFRS for SME’s) adopted by the institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka (ICASL).

2.2 Responsibility for Financial statements

The committee members are responsible for the preparation and presentation of the Financial Statements.

2.3 Approval of Financial Statements by Committee of members

The Financial Statements for the year ended 31st December 2020, were authorized for issue by the Committee of members on 22nd March 2021.

2.4 Basis of Measurement

The Financial Statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis and applied consistently with no adjustments being made for inflationary factors affecting the financial statements.

These Financial Statements have been prepared on the basis that the Institute would continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

2.5 Functional and Presentation Currency

The Financial Statements are presented in Sri Lankan Rupee (LKR), which is the Institute’s functional currency.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION (CONTINUED)

2.6 Use of Estimates and Judgments

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with SLFRS for SMEs requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised if the revision affect only that period or in the period or revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

2.7 Materiality and Aggregation

Each material class of similar items is presented separately in the financial statements. Items of a dissimilar nature or function are presented separately unless they are immaterial.

3. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT POLICIES

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements unless otherwise indicated.

Certain comparative amounts in the financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the current year's presentation.

(a) Foreign Currency Translation

All transactions in foreign currencies are translated to Sri Lanka Rupees at the foreign exchange rates prevailing at the time of such transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the reporting date are translated into Sri Lanka Rupees at the foreign exchange rates prevailing on that date. The foreign exchange differences arising on translation are recognized in the Statement of income and expenditure and accumulated fund.

(b) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances and call deposits with maturities of three months or less from the acquisition date that are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in their fair value and are used by the Institute in the management of its short-term commitments. The statement of Cash Flow is reported based on the indirect method.

(c) Property, plant and equipment

(i) Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. The cost of self-constructed assets includes the Cost of materials and direct labour, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the assets to a working condition for their intended use and when the group of asset to obligation to remove the asset or restore the site, an estimate of the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located, and capitalized borrowing costs. Purchased software that is integral to the functionality of the related equipment is capitalized as part of that equipment.

(c) Property, plant and equipment (continued)

When an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment. Any gains and losses on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognized in profit or loss.

(ii) Subsequent Measurement

Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Institute incurred.

(iii) Depreciation

Items of property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight- line basis in profit or loss over the estimated useful lives of each component. Items of property, plant and equipment are depreciated from the date that they are installed and are ready for use, or in respect of internally constructed assets, from the date that the asset is completed and ready for use.

The estimated useful lives of Property, plant and equipment are as follows:

All assets are depreciated from the month of the asset is available for use up to the month of disposal.

(d) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Institute and the revenue can be reliably measured on an accrual basis. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. The following specific criteria are used for the purpose of recognition of revenue.

(i) Membership subscription

Membership subscription is accounted for on time accrual basis.

(ii) Interest income

Interest income represents the interest on fixed deposits and is accounted on accrual basis.

(e) Expenses

All expenditure incurred in the operations of the business and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency have been charged to income in arriving at the Institute's profit/loss for the year.

(f) Funds

i) Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are those that are available for use by the organization at the discretion of the Committee, in furtherance of the general objectives of the organization and which are not designated for any specific purpose.

ii) Restricted funds

Where the grants are received for use in an identified project or activity, such funds are held in a restricted fund account and transferred to the statement of income and expenditure to match with expenses incurred in respect of identified project. Utilized funds are held in their respective fund accounts and included under accumulated fund in the statement of financial position until such time as they are required.

iii) Designated funds

Unrestricted funds designated by the Committee for a specific purpose are identified as designated funds. The activities for which these funds may be used are identified in the financial statements.

iv) CILT building fund

CILT building fund is a fund held by the Institute with the purpose of raising funds for a new building. Further the 15% of profits generated from Institute's profitable events are to be transferred this fund.

(g) Income Tax Expenses

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. Income tax is recognized in the income statement except to the extent that it relates to items recognized directly in equity, in which case it is recognized in equity.

(i) Current tax

Current tax is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year, using tax rates enacted at the reporting date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

(ii) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method, on for temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the tax base of assets and liabilities, which is the amount attributed to those assets and liabilities for tax purposes. The amount of deferred tax provided is based on the expected manner of realization or settlement of the carrying amount of assets and liabilities, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted as at the reporting date. Deferred tax liabilities are not recognized for the permanent differences.

(h) Events occurring after the reporting date

All material events occurring after reporting date events have been considered and where necessary adjustments to or disclosures in the financial statements have been made.

(i) Capital commitments and contingencies

Contingencies are possible assets or obligations that arise from a past event and would be confirmed only on the occurrence or non-occurrence of uncertain future events, which are beyond the Institute's control. Commitments and contingent liabilities are disclosed in notes to the financial statement

22 COVID-19 impact assessment by the management

As a result of outbreak of the Corona virus disease (COVID-19) which was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization in March 2020. Institute has a significant impact on the income. Further, the majority of the Institute's income is generated from corporate partnerships and consequently the company recorded a drop in corporate partnership income due to cancellation of corporate partnership agreements.
